Every term pupils are assessed using the Star Reading programme and this enables teaching staff to monitor the progress.


We are committed to helping every pupil read more confidently and will support them in this endeavour.




PSHE

Pupils are encouraged to develop their own rules to abide by when discussing tricky topics.






Art - Mrs Aveyard


we embarked on




about demonstrating her skills using this technique to draw some rather fluffy chicks.


Once mastered we applied all we had learnt to create our final observational drawing pieces, which I think Mr Klee himself would have been impressed with.

Winter Wonderland Immersive Experience

<u>Meaning</u> – Scandinavian in origin, referring to a fictional, gruesome, ice creature.

By artist Wintercroft, and produced by arts charity ARCADE, the experience demonstrates the magic that can be created from a bit of imagination and a lot of recycling. It encourages you to discover ways to help the fragile land by working alongside an unexpected investigator to see the impact we can have on the environment we live in – both in and outside of Grue.



We were asked as part of an ongoing community project spanning the whole year, if we would join local artists, including Shan Barker, in creating this Winter Wonderland

Immersive Experience.
Pupils worked like Santa's elves to make Christmas trees from recycled paper as part of this project

along with other local schools. We were then given the opportunity to return once it was complete to see if we could spot our contributions and to experience what it feels likes to be part of something much bigger.

Built by Scarborough's community and made entirely of recycled and repurposed materials, Grue is a wandering cardboard labyrinth of rooms to explore and wonders to discover. Back by popular demand, the walk-through immersive

Maths with Mr Tostevin

This autumn term has been a busy time for our maths students.

We have welcomed several new students Tiegan, Charleigh, Charley, Olivia and Rayanne who have all started to make pleasing contributions during mathematic lessons.

Year 11's have started preparing for their mock exams in January and are aware of the importance of regularly attendance. These are some of the GCSE maths topics that our pupils have been studying during this autumn: Ratio and Scale, Probability, Decimals and Percentages and Trigonometry.

The GCSE mathematics examinations for Year 11 next term consist of one non-calculator and two calculator papers. These examinations assess pupils' skills in problem solving skills relating to real life maths situations. In addition to this problem solving and justification of their solution has become an integral part of our pupils' mathematics lessons.

I look forward to continuing to work with the pupils after the Christmas holidays.

We look forward to making you feel part of our friendly community.






Science with Mr Togwell

This term in year 11 the students have been completing the units on Physical Chemistry and Organic Chemistry. Pupils are working towards completing the units into next term so they can start revising for the exams in biology, physics and chemistry in preparation of the June examination.

Here, Alex is testing compounds in a flame test to determine what elements are in the chemical.

Skye is measuring temperature changes in endothermic and exothermic reactions.



In Key Stage 3, the Year 8 pupils have been working on units on animal cells. They have been learning about cells and organs in the human body.

Tegan is placing foods in different test tubes with Benedict's solution to test which contain sugar.

Here Trenton is testing foods for starch in the lesson about nutrients in foods, and digestion.



Drop Down Day - Anti-bullying

The SPRS hold what we call Drop down Day's throughout the year. These days are a time for the whole school to come together and focus on different topics. In September we looked at Anti-bullying.

This was a day where the pupils discussed all aspects of bullying and how this affects their lives, even in future years. Bullying comes in different forms and this was discussed through small group work.

This was a huge success where everyone got a chance to understand why all types of bullying should be stamped out. Pupils also had the opportunity to discuss various topics that affect their lives here at the PRU.









Life skills with Mrs Atkinson

This term in Life Skills, KS3 have been focusing on Relationships.

Tegan and Trenton started off the term exploring what It means to be a good friend. Both pupils engaged in how we are similar as friends and also how we can be different.

By the end of the topic, it was clear that KS3 had a good understanding of the importance of friendship and of respectful relationships.


For the second half of the term, the pupils have been working hard on the Bullying Project. KS3 used their team building skills to collaboratively describe what bullying is to them and formed a definition. KS3 described

bullying as "someone who repeatedly and

deliberately means to hurt someone.



This can be verbal, physical, emotional or sexual." Well done KS3, you should be proud of yourselves!



Social Emotional Aspects of Learning with Mrs Atkinson

This term in SEAL we have been learning about The Zones of Regulation. The pupils have been working hard to develop their awareness of feelings, energy and alertness levels while exploring a variety of tools and strategies for regulation, self-care and overall wellness.



Skye and Louise worked well together to categorise the different emotions into the four zones whilst creating the visual display for the classroom. We had an interesting discussion surrounding emotions and how we can identify these in ourselves.

Alex has done a fantastic job of increasing his emotional vocabulary by adding even more emotion words to the zones. It was brilliant to see him recognise that the more you understand how you are feeling, the better



you are at controlling yourself and making better choices.



Corby and Jack have been making excellent progress during this topic. They have demonstrated that they can easily identify how certain behaviours make other people think and feel.
Understanding that people's feelings can be changed by the behaviour of

others around them is an important concept to learn.

Tegan, Trenton and Olivia have reflecting on how others are viewing their behaviour through social behaviour mapping. This has facilitated some interesting discussions about how we view other people's perspectives





concepts and have created some interesting work and discussions.




Citizenship

understanding of how the wider world effects British life.




Humanities


Macmillan Coffee Morning 2022




On September 30th the PRU held our annual MacMillan coffee morning.

Remembrance Day 2022


This year at the PRU we held a special assembly to commemorate Remembrance Day and to understand the reasons behind it.

We wish them the best of luck with their future endeavours.














Summer School
