Printmaking dates back several thousand years and its traditional methods are still used to this day by artisans looking to create unique and interesting artwork.

As would-be artisans ourselves, we decided that we too could take on these traditional methods and learn some new skills along the way. Whether the starting point was taken from studying other cultures such as Adinkra symbols created by the Akan people of Ghana and used in ceremonial clothing or whether it was the designer William Morris with his complex, intertwining natural forms, the processes we discovered, were very similar. <u> PSHE – Mrs Aveyard</u>



Emergency! Emergency! You enter a room to find someone laid on the floor! Panic? There is no need to panic. Our Key Stage Three pupils thankfully have the skills. They now know exactly what to do...phew! With a bit of practice, we are now confident that we can check for danger, assess the situation, call for help and place someone into the recovery position.

Later in the term we tackled the topic of bullying. As always, we referred to our favourite acronym ...

Several Times On Purpose. We can identify different forms of bullying and how to deal with them. More complicated are the reasons why bullies bully. Sometimes the hardest thing of all is to be kind to them. We never truly know what's going on in someone's life. Let's talk more.

Key Stage Four were more concerned with staying healthy. Diet, exercise and sleep, so much to balance. We became myth busters, researching popular health myths and created a board game which was fraught with danger. The upside though, was that if we had enough sleep that week, it allowed us to move forward three spaces, rather than having to slide down the strawberry lace to the beginning again. This term in Literacy we have delved into the story, 'The Boy in the Dress' written by David Walliams. The book's main theme is "difference", encouraging the readers to see that tolerance and freedom make the world a nicer place.



Pupils worked through analysing characters, exploring gender norms and descriptive writing. They all worked very well and appeared to have a genuine interest in the story and the characters.



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At the beginning of the topic, I asked the male pupils if they would wear a dress? With most saying, "No" or "I wouldn't dare". However, after finishing the story, the majority had



changed their answer to a, "Yeah!", some even specified the type of dress they wanted! So, on the last day of term, I gave the pupils a chance to actually wear a dress!

As you can see, they had no worries putting it on. They had a catwalk in the car park and strutted their stuff around school showing their teachers and peers.

World Book Day at the PRU.

March 5th was World Book Day and Mrs Ford was determined it was going to be a fun day.

She encouraged most of the staff to get dressed up as their favourite characters for "World Book Day" and was really pleased to see so many staff get involved.



In tutor time, tutors completed a guiz identifying the book titles and two teams came joint first!

The morning carried on by completing various activities all associated with reading and World Book Day.

Religious Education – Miss Oldham

This term we have been looking at the term 'Worship' what it means, where it comes from and how it is practiced. Pupils have been researching different types of worship in relation to different religious groups as well as looking at their own opinions and point of view.

We then moved onto discussing 'Moral Dilemmas', 'Prejudice' and 'Discrimination'. Towards the end of the term we have debated, 'What happens when we die?' and how different religions have different theories. Pupils found it interesting to see the differences amongst them and their peers.

We also celebrated 'World Religion Day 2025', some pupils made some fantastic posters, highlighting the different religions and their key beliefs and values.

Humanities – Mrs Aveyard

This term, our pupils have been deeply engaged in an important and thought-provoking topic: homelessness in the UK and the

wider world. Through our lessons, discussions, and creative writing, pupils have explored the causes, challenges, and possible solutions to this global issue.

We began by examining homelessness in the UK, looking at real-life stories, statistics, and the struggles faced by those without a stable home. Pupils discussed the different reasons people become homeless, from financial hardship to family breakdowns.

We then widened our focus to explore homelessness around the world, comparing experiences in different countries, including slums in India, refugee crises, and communities affected by natural disasters.



Our pupils demonstrated incredible empathy and creativity throughout this unit. They participated in: ✓ **Diary Writing:** Pupils wrote powerful diary entries from the perspective of a homeless person, capturing the emotions, daily struggles, and hopes of those living without a permanent home. ✓ **Discussions & Debates:** PUPILS passionately debated how society should support the homeless and shared their own ideas for solutions. Research Projects: Pupils investigated charities

that help homeless individuals.
