We are now at the end of what has been a very challenging year for staff and pupils. As a Nurture school it has been particularly difficult as it is the positive relationships we build with the pupils which break down many of those barriers to learning.

Staff have upskilled very quickly in areas of ICT, in which many were not confident, and we now have work updated regularly on TEAMS which pupils can access from home. This is still a learning curve for many as we start to explore different ways of continuing those relationships through a variety of mediums.

Some pupils continued to attend school over the various lockdowns and it was a pleasure to get to know those pupils better and to have the opportunity to try out new activities with them. For those pupils who worked from home I know that staff really enjoyed coming out to see them once per week during lockdown when they delivered the food parcels and had a catch-up.

However, we are pleased to have all the pupils back in school, it was too quiet without them and once again if feels like a busy, happy and vibrant place. it has taken time to build attendance back up to pre-covid levels but we hope that this will continue in September. Some pupils have been able to take their functional skills exams and others produced enough evidence to be entered for their GCSEs.

We have lost some staff over the Covid period and will also be losing some staff at the end of term. We are sad to see them go but wish them all the best in their new ventures. Emma will be moving on to become an Inclusion Hub manager and Gemma will be training to be a social worker.



We would also like to say thank you and goodbye to Pamela Wilkinson who has been a great help volunteering with us this past term, she also will be moving onto pastures new within the Early Help service.

Mathematics with Mr Darrington

It's been a strange term for maths in lockdown at the PRU. Highlighted by attendance issues due to COVID, However, learning continued - some of it online.

Y10 have covered volume of prisms and cylinders, perimeter and area, coordinates revision, scatter graphs, expanding brackets and simplifying and rearranging equations. Alongside revision of the four operations. Liv worked tremendously throughout the term, demonstrating fantastic mental arithmetic skills.

Y11 have been plotting equations on graphs, equations of straight lines, area and circumference of a circle. Then we used past papers to help inform estimated GCSE grades. Josh began using a calculator more to check his amazing mental arithmetic.



KS3 looked at pictograms, bar charts and coordinates. Area of a triangle, parallelogram, trapezium and rectangle, area of simple compound shapes, column subtraction and addition. Christian's times tables improved enormously. Lizzie worked well all term. And Charley made a good start.

I installed TT Rock Stars, a times table learning consolidation game. All pupils were given their own password. Pupils that gave an opinion really enjoyed it.

I think everyone is looking forward to the summer holidays and a fresh start in September.

It has been a busy term for our Primary Provision. Even though we have been in lockdown we have had all our children in over this term on a part time basis. Our topic has been Rainforests. We have been researching where all the rainforests are in the world, what the biggest rainforest is and where it is, what the climate is like, what animals live there, Aleisha was astounded to learn that there are over 2000 species of butterfly living in the rainforest!

Science with Mr Togwell

<u>Key Stage 3</u> pupils have worked on the Biology B1 topic on Cells. Here Charley is working on making a model cell from a food bag, wall paper paste, a plastic ball and curled wool. The parts represent the Cell membrane, cytoplasm, nucleus and Chromosomes in a cell.





<u>Key Stage 4</u> Have been working on units in the biology GCSE on Plants and Photosynthesis. In this picture pupils are removing the

green Chlorophyll from leaves to test them with Iodine for starch. Leaves that turn black contain Starch.

In history we thought it made sense to learn about The Great Fire of London since it happened just after The Great Plague of London which we had just been studying before Christmas. As terrible as the Great Fire was it was important to look at the positives to come from such a disaster. It ended up being one of the main contributing factors to stopping the plague that had wreaked havoc and had taken so many lives. Liv was astonished to discover that only six people died in the fire considering the amount of buildings that were destroyed in such a short space of time. We set to work building our own version of Pudding Lane. Our chief architect Christi constructed most of the buildings including the main culprit Thomas Farriner's Bakery. Charley and Lizzi were our main fact checkers, making sure to include details of elements that had helped it spread so quickly. A strong wind, very dry Summer, poorly maintained buildings made of wattle and daub and packed tightly together led to an unfortunate result. Thankfully what was learnt from this disaster helped build a much improved London with a shiny new cathedral courtesy of Christopher Wren and the beginnings of the first proper fire service that we come to rely on these days.

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


Careers with Mrs Rogers

Cooking with Miss Starbuck



We have been trying to encourage independence in the kitchen, giving ownership of the session to the pupils and only interrupting to ensure they are using the oven and knives in a safe way. Hopefully this will lead to them being more able to cook for themselves in the future. Pupils are expected to follow the recipe instructions, find the ingredients and equipment themselves, wash-up and clear away.

Some pupils have therefore decided that they would like to cook meals which all the family would be able to eat that evening, often pasta based meals but it has also been positive to see them adding vegetables and herbs which they might not necessarily eat themselves.

We have explored a wide range of colleges and further education providers, including, Scarboorugh TEC, Scarborough Sixth Form, East Riding college, YH training, York college, Bishop Burton, Future Works, The Hair Academy, Skills Village and apprenticeships.

We will be attending open days at a number of colleges for pupils to feel supported in their transition and for them to be able to meet staff and explore their new education setting.

The further education settings which our pupils will be moving on to include Scarborough TEC, York College, Skills Village and The Hair Academy.

Some pupils would like to explore apprenticeships which we will look at in the next few months.

The stresses and difficulties of Lockdown had to continue from the previous year until the present time, but hopefully most restrictions will soon be eased and we may be able to return to what is considered 'normal' life.

We have a new Governor, Professor Chris Cooper of Leeds Beckett University who brings expertise in tourism and business to the experienced Management Committee.

A reduction in funding caused a staff restructuring and we are sorry to have lost some valuable staff members. The current financial situation is now stable and we are able to approve a positive budget for the next three years.

A planning application to develop private residences in the former Westborough College building with an annex below the PRU site of further homes, has been approved with some amendments following our representation to the Local Planning Authority. We continue to have concerns over the condition of our current building and press the Local Authority to relocate us.

The Local Authority requested the temporary services of our Head teacher in supporting Brompton Hall school to which we agreed and we appointed our current Assistant Headteacher Mrs Wendy Chopping to the post of Acting Head teacher, who continues to maintain a calm learning atmosphere.
